PUBLIC COMMENTS

Dear Mayor Bylsma, and Council,

After this meeting, I invite Council and our community to watch a beautiful 47 second video on Facebook from our Mayor addressing our community, posted on April 9th 2020 at 4:06pm. The message is titled: **What is most important to me this [Easter] Weekend**. You'll note that 100% of the feedback was positive. It was shared multiple times, and viewed over 1,200 times. His personal message was welcomed by our community. No special meeting required. He raised a flag that day, metaphorically speaking, to share a part of himself with the community. To share something that has meaning to him. Something he values. Part of his identity, so to speak. It was received and welcomed by the community. No special meeting required. No policies, no procedures, no Clerks or Council discussions. No special meeting required....

Did our Mayor truly raise a flag that day? No not really, however his 47 second message was heard over 1,200 times. He didn't *need* a flag to get the attention of his community, because they were already listening. Without judgement, without protest. Pride Niagara reached out to West Lincoln for support via email on April 23rd 2020, and again on May 18th 2020. Our Mayor recalls seeing those emails in his discussion with Matt Holmes, however as he expresses in the interview, and through his correspondence with our concerned Councillors, he was overloaded by the burden of spam messages, and dealing with an ongoing pandemic. He saw them, but they had slipped through the cracks. Perhaps had our Mayor *flagged* those emails for attention, it would have served as a reminder that there were items needing his review. Not only did those items *need* his review, but in order for them to *have* his review and that of Council, there were *special protocols* in place. In his words to his fellow councillors "Pride Niagara can make the request to West Lincoln and there is a protocol for the process outlined by the CAO". Pride Niagara would need to make their request, again. They would need to "make the request to West Lincoln" this time. If that statement leaves you confused, you are not alone.

The date was missed. Flags were flown all across Niagara, and videos of support were shared and celebrated. Meanwhile, the voices of West Lincoln were silent. We had put our trust that our Mayor and Council would be our voice in times like these, however our voices had slipped through the cracks. A special meeting was requested so that we may be heard, but it was not supported by our Mayor. After all, why should a flag get a special meeting? *Why* was a special meeting required? Council pushed forward on our behalf. Our voices would be heard in a special meeting on June 16th! On June 11th 2020 our Mayor accepted an interview with Matt Holmes from iHeart Radio. An interview where he shared his views and his politics, while representing West Lincoln. Some of our voices were heard and shared, but only those that supported *his* view. Some of our voices, or "chatter" as our Mayor had described it, had also been present in the dialogue that week, but they would not be shared that day. Our voices would have to wait until June 16th at 11am. The interview our Mayor gave where he shared his views and his politics had lasted **29 minutes and 43 seconds**. No special meeting required.

Pride Niagara had made a request on May 18th 2020. A request for a 30 to 60 second video of support and a symbolic raising of the flag. No request had been made to hold up the flag for any given length of time, merely a **30 second video** would suffice. We are now here today at this special meeting, wondering just how *special* our voices really are. For we needed this *special* meeting, or more accurately this *emergency* meeting to flag down our Mayor's, and our Council's attention. That is after all, what flags are for.

So, in the Mayor's words "What are they still fighting for"? We are fighting for a day when acceptance, and equal opportunity to be heard is met with "*no special meeting required...*"

Until then, please continue to leave this item flagged for your attention....

Dear Esteemed Councillors and Mayor,

First of all, I would like to thank you all for your hard work each and every day to make West Lincoln a safe and peaceful community. This is not an easy or light task, especially in the past few months with our province and country in a state of emergency due to Covid-19.

In recent days there has been a heavy push from the community for our municipal halls in West Lincoln to fly a pride flag for the LGBT2QIA+ community. I would like to present several arguments opposed to this.

A flag is the defining symbol of what makes you different from everyone else. Having a national flag is important because this means you are not ruled by any other country. It makes you unique. It means everyone in that country unites under that nation's authority and law.

Canada is a free, equal, and diverse society. This is what makes us unique. We have freedoms and equalities that many countries around the world do not have. We have a diversity that most countries only dream of obtaining. We, as Canadians, should be truly proud to be part of Canada!

I am not gay, but that does not mean I am any less Canadian, and any less accepted and protected under Canadian law and rule. A person from the LGBT2QIA+ community can say the same – they are not less Canadian and are not less accepted and protected under Canadian law and rule. They and I are on equal footing in our government's eyes. They are not above the law of Canada, but rather we are united under that law. This is why we submit to being under the Canadian flag.

To lower the Canadian flag is a demeaning act to all Canadians and all Canada stands for. To claim that one community rises above the rest of Canada is to therefore lower the importance of all other Canadians who do not fall under that category. Every Canadian who is not a member of the gay community need not feel bigoted and hated by them and made to live under their flag. The LGBT2QIA+ community cannot think they usurp our government's rule over all Canadians by raising their flag above Canada's flag. The same is true for our province and municipality's flags.

The role of the municipal government is to adhere to the laws and rules given by our federal and provincial governments. The federal government fights for all minority groups in Canada to be equal and free through law. The municipal government is to be non-partisan when it comes to political issues. I advocate that it remains so – the municipal council serves the community best when it focuses solely on the tasks that the provincial government requires of it (ie. Financial allocations; by-law enforcement; maintenance of roads, parks, community buildings, etc.)

We are all united with our pride for Canada above all else. We accept we have differences and yet we stand together strong – strong in freedom; strong in equality; strong in diversity. We are not all part of the LGBT2QIA+ community, but we are all part of West Lincoln community in Canada. Please, let's remain strong and live peaceably under that one flag – the red and white, Canadian, maple leaf Flag!

Attendance to any large-scale Pride parade will see all manner of promiscuity being promoted, simulated sex acts, and graphic nudity. Pride is a celebration of sexuality without any constraints. While as an adult I know that people are free to make these choices, as a mother I have the responsibility to point my children to best practises. People have the freedom to choose their lifestyle, but they can never be free from the resultants of their choices. There is more tied up in the rainbow flag than just "acknowledgement and acceptance of people", and to suggest that a town can fly the flag without actively endorsing all it stands for is more than a little naive. I have seen prominent members of the LGBTQ2+ community, under the banner of that flag, call for an end to monogamous relationships, the dismantling of the nuclear family, the abolishment of the titles 'mother' and 'father'. Are these views indicative of all members of the community? Certainly not. But when you fly the flag you don't get to specify what parts of the ideology you are accepting and endorsing to citizens. I think it is far outside of the town's purview to be endorsing sexuality without constraints to our youth.

I also find it interesting, that the mayor, being derided as intolerant, and a bigot, is the only person who actually talked about an honest debate. From the 'tolerant and inclusive' people, I have seen calls for a "quick fix", calls for the mayor's resignation, and an apology-- No discussion necessary. This is not acceptable. We cannot silence viewpoints just because we disagree with them. If you believe inclusivity and equality is important, you don't get to decide that certain ideas are less equal, or not worthy of inclusion. I don't think any of us want to be part of a society where one feels compelled to keep their thoughts to themselves.

Now. It is rather an awkward position, to be the only municipality not flying the flag. It would have been nice if the others had thought more about what they were endorsing before making decisions. If the town wants to show their support for members of the LGBTQ2+ community, who says it has to be done with the rainbow flag? There are social equality flags that could be used. You could make it a yearly contest for people to design a flag showing equality. You could go the extreme safe route and make a flag that says "We respect and value LGBTQ2+ people". Any of these options should satisfy the LGBTQ2+ community, without the town indiscriminately endorsing all things Pride.

Please don't conflate loving, respecting, and valuing LGBTQ2+ people with a full endorsement of the pride movement.

Dear members of West Lincoln Council,

We are writing with regard to Mayor Bylsma's radio interview with Matt Holmes of CKTB radio and the controversy around flying the Pride flag. It appears the mayor has made an ad hoc decision to not raise the Pride flag based on his personal beliefs.

We listened to the full interview with dismay. We found Mayor Bylsma's initial and rather rambling explanation of an email that went forgotten or not being received by those who should have seen it, etc. as disingenuous. Had that explanation been sincere, the flag could have been quickly raised with an apology; no harm no foul. We find the mayor's explanation, however, an example of "selective neglect".

Then followed the mayor's insistence that the Pride flag serves no real purpose now that gay rights are enshrined into law, totally missing the purpose of Pride month and the Pride flag. There are LGBTQ people in West Lincoln, adults and youths, who still need our affirmation, who still face both subtle and overt unacceptance, who would feel reassured by this symbol of their place in our community. How painful the mayor's words must be to them and their families.

Then followed many minutes of personal interpretations of what our mayor repeatedly called **Identity Politics**, seemingly using the term for political movements that make him feel uncomfortable and repeating that those groups which already have their rights enshrined in law need no special recognition, then saying that protests have been going on for the last 30 years (unclear why he picked 30) and nothing has worked and no progress made.

Indigenous Rights - the mayor referred to armed guards at the entrances to the Six Nations Reserve near Brantford as an example of no positive progress for indigenous rights over many years of protests. A quick search found an article of explanation in the Spectator from earlier this spring (see Spectator article, March 27 "Protect our elders"). These guards are members of the reserve's own police force who have been monitoring traffic in and out of the reserve after a large group of people entered, breaking covid-19 restrictions, putting the health of residents at greater risk. How embarrassing that our mayor would go on local radio with opinions and personal observations without checking the facts. No progress? Does Mayor Bylsma know that more than 80% of Canada's indigenous population now lives off reserves? And that compensation for the Residential School system is happening now? There's much, much more work to be done, but political action and civic engagement have brought changes.

Black Lives Matter - yes, **all** lives certainly do matter. We've heard no one in the Black Lives Matter movement deny that, although they object to All Lives Matter being used to dismiss their protests. Some lives are certainly more at risk during interactions with the police. That is the point they want recognized.

The mayor's lack of understanding of the purpose of civil rights movements, the work of those who seek social justice, the progress being made and the work still to be done is very

frustrating. One of us (Linda) was present when the Age Friendly flag was raised at the township hall recently. Mayor Bylsma was present too. There was no question that this was a worthy symbol of our township's acceptance of a group of its citizens and a commitment to make the town a good place to live for all ages. So why the difference in the mayor's attitude between the two flags? What he hasn't stated out loud seems obvious to us. The Age Friendly flag isn't controversial and he has no personal objections to it. The Pride flag, we suspect, runs counter to his personal beliefs about gay rights and perhaps his religious beliefs as well. He is most certainly entitled to his personal beliefs, we defend his right to his beliefs. But he is not entitled to impose them on West Lincoln. Mayor Bylsma was not being required to march in a Pride parade, just fly a symbol of unity and acceptance, a symbol displayed by all other municipalities in our region.

Our mayor seems to be a hard-working and sincere person who wants the best for West Lincoln and its residents. He has made a serious misstep and needs to correct the situation quickly, apologize and move on.

We appreciate the council's decision to meet.

Re: Pride Niagara's request to the municipality of West Lincoln to fly the Pride Flag with the Canadian flag

It is disappointing but necessary that I am writing this correspondence to be read into public record. I feel that this is required for a number of reasons:

1. The LGBTQ+ residents, children, business owners, employees and volunteers at any of our local businesses and service agencies need to know that they are respected, loved and supported in our community;
2. Those who belong to any marginalized or racialized communities need to know that they are respected, loved and supported in our community;
3. Mr. DeDivitiis, Chairperson 2020/2021 Pride Niagara Board of Directors and Mr. Vanderklis, member of the Curve Lake First Nation and all of those who belong to any marginalized or racialized communities need to know that the actions of the Mayor are not reflective of the views of the town's citizens.
4. Those looking to live or invest in the township need to know that West Lincoln acts in accordance with the statement on its website as being a "a blended community of different perspectives, beliefs and interests" and "a progressive municipality";
5. Ensure the Mayor hears these views that were included in the emails that I sent to himself, as well as Councillors Cheryl Gannan and William Reilly. I received prompt replies from both Councillors, but have not received a reply from the Mayor so I can only assume he has not read them.

If you have not already done so, I urge the Mayor and all Councillors to read the posts on social media by our young leaders of tomorrow. These thoughtful posts are the voices of those that you represent. Please read, listen and learn so that you can use your positions to affect the change that they are demanding.

At this time, I would like to thank Councillor William Reilly for bringing a sense of urgency to the call to raise the Pride flag using all of the tools at his means, culminating in this special Council meeting.

The Mayor is quoted as saying “the Pride flag might fly at town hall, but only after a ‘proper debate’” (St. Catharines Standard, June 12, 2020).

It would appear that the Code of Conduct (<https://www.westlincoln.ca/en/township-office/resources/Code-of-Conduct-for-Council-and-Boards---2019.pdf>) that governs their roles on the West Lincoln Council as outlined in section 2.2 and 4.1 and the objectives of Pride Niagara should be fully aligned. Therefore, supporting the request of Pride Niagara should not require debate. However, every day that passes without raising the Pride flag amplifies the position that the township of West Lincoln does not “respect the individual rights, values, beliefs and personality traits of any other person, recognizing that all persons are entitled to be treated equally with dignity and respect for their personal status regarding gender, sexual orientation, race, creed, religion, ability and spirituality” (Code of Conduct section 4.1, paragraph (e)).

A progressive Council would have diversity and inclusion as an imperative in its strategic and operational plans, and report publicly on the progress against their plans. Flying the Pride flag in support of Pride Niagara would be a straightforward approval under this plan.

The only debate required is: how can Council create the conditions to ensure equality and build a community that celebrates and respects diversity; a community that everyone is proud of and wants to live and invest? This debate would follow educational sessions for Council that would explore topics such as, how bad is it in West Lincoln for those in the LGBTQ+ community? What inequities are being experienced? Why are some residents leaving and what experiences are preventing others from settling in West Lincoln? What are the perceptions of West Lincoln held by the business community looking to invest in the Niagara region?

As part of this imperative, a progressive Council would reach out to the organizations representing racialized and marginalized communities to ask for their input and assistance and pose ‘how can we help?’, ‘what more can we do?’

None of the following are debatable as they are included in the Code of Conduct or as key facets of the Community’s Strategic Plan.

- Council should live up to its stated Mission of providing responsive customer service by accepting all requests by residents or community-based groups. If a resident or community group sends an inquiry or request to anyone on Council, the recipient should immediately refer the request to the appropriate committee or staff member and respond to the requestor with the actions taken. The requestor can be educated on the preferred so any future request is administered with less hand offs. A regressive Council hides behind missed emails and uses process to delay action.
- Council will “...respect Council’s decision-making process even if they disagree with Council’s ultimate determinations and rulings” (Code of Conduct section 4.1, paragraph (h)).

I urge Council to go beyond the compromise tabled by Pride Niagara to raise the Pride flag on June 1, 2021. Council should raise the Pride flag to fly with the Canadian flag immediately and for the remainder of Pride Month.

The day is young, why not raise it today? Every day that passes makes any subsequent apology a hollow one.

Let all residents in West Lincoln celebrate our differences and fight for equality for everyone, something that is urgently needed. Let us love one another. Love is love.

Our family has been living in Grassie for 18 years. My husband, John, had lived in Smithville all his life before we set roots in Grassie. We have not always agreed with council through the years but we have always believed that decisions were made for the benefit of most, if not all residents.

However, after listening to the interview that our mayor gave on Thursday, June 11, we were appalled. The obvious bias that our mayor has against many marginalized groups within our community is evident. I'm sure he doesn't have any difficulty collecting tax money from all citizens however he apparently has difficulty being respectful of all the members in our community.

In most cases, when someone misspeaks an apology can normally fix the error. What Mayor Bylsma said was not an example of someone misspeaking. He showed us that he would rather stick to the beliefs and agenda of the CHP that he is president of, than fulfill his duty to respect and fairly represent all the citizens of West Lincoln.

As you know a petition has been circulating online, which I am very proud to say was our daughter's idea. There are approximately 3400 signatures at this point. The majority of the community that I have spoken with have had enough of bias and prejudice. We cannot allow ourselves to be represented by a mayor who cannot separate his personal and religious beliefs from his elected position.

We are asking for Mayor Bylsma's resignation. There is nothing he can do to convince us that he can fulfil his obligations in a fair, policy based and non biased manner.

I would like to know, as our councillor how you will be addressing this issue.
